

Is your blood worth bottling? Woy Woy Apexians hope it is. On Sunday, March 12, they will ask people between the ages of 18 and 60 living in the Woy Woy district to attend one of two local doctors' surgeries to have a sample of their blood taken for grouping purposes.

Their names and addresses, together with their blood type, will then be listed at the Gosford District Hospital Blood Bank for call

in cases of emergency.
An actual donation of blood on March 12 will not be required and calls made in the future on this emergency list would

be infrequent.

Apart from the fact that a list of willing blood donors registered with Gosford District

District Hospital could mean the difference between life and death of a patient, donors themselves would benefit from knowing benefit from knowing their own blood type in the case of an emergency involving their own need for a transfusion.

A Sunday was chosen for the taking of the blood samples as it was blood samples as it was felt this would probably be the most convenient day for the majority of

people.

This is the first time an organised appeal for blood donors registered blood donors has ever been made in the Woy Woy district.

Sister Shirley Day, the sister in charge of the Gosford Hospital Blood Bank, has pointed out that the giving of a blood sample is a completely painless procedure and takes only a few minutes.

Sister Day said that the Gosford Hospital had approximately 550 donors who supported the death of a patient need not occur again.

AGE LIMITATIONS

People wishing to registe as donors on March 12 must be over eight stone in weight and between the ages of 18 and 60 (donors under 21 are required to sign a statement that their parents are aware of their intention to volunteer as blood tion to volunteer as blood donors).

They should also be prepared to sign a questionaire regarding past illnesses (if any) as this is for the protection of both the donor's health

both the donor's health and that of the recipient. If at a later date a person whose name is listed is called upon to donate blood he or she can be assured that this, nowadays, is also a pain-less procedure which takes not more than from 10 to 20 minutes. The amount taken varies 14 to 17 ozs. and from done by means of a Der-wajet introducer, not a needle.

Appointments may also be now made for giv-ing blood directly with the Blood Bank at Gos-ford Hospital.

This Department is open five days a week, in-cluding one evening until 9 pm and one Sat-urday a month.

Although blood has a short life as "whole blood" the would-be donshort blood" the would-be don-or is assured that his gift is never wasted. If, after a period of seven days, the blood has not been used locally it is sent to the Sydney Blood Bank to be processed into the many health giving bi-products of blood which include: Albumen for ser-um which is used when um which is used when whole blood is not avail-able and which may be able and which may be stored indefinitely; a glo-bulin, used in the treat-ment of pregnant women exposed to German exposed to German measles and hepatitis, mumps, poliomylitis, etc.; fileninogen, used to assist in the control of bleeding when blood will asnot clot properly; and Antihaemophilic globulin, used to control bleeding which is the result of haemophilie disease (bleeders).
