"My interest first began when my daughter joined brownies and, as always, there was a shortage of parents to support the movement," Mrs Williams explained.

"I joined the local association and eventually trained as a brownie guider."

Mrs Williams progressed from there to become a local association president, a branch secretary and finally a District Commissioner.

In this role, she acts as a liaison between guiders and parents and passes information from headquarters, through the guiders to brownies and guides.

She has one guide company and three brownie packs - one of which is an "extension" pack for handicapped children, under her supervision.

"At the moment we're in desperate need of two guiders - one for the brownies and one for the guides," Mrs Williams explained.

"We're also trying to raise money to purchase a bus to transport the girls of the extension pack on outings and to and from meetings."

Mrs Williams works full time as a health service aid in community nursing.

This involves her in working for elderly people in the community - calling on them and doing errands where necessary, such as shopping and housework and so on.

She works two days a week at the Wyoming hospital on a "relief of strain" program and enjoys doing craftwork for relaxation.
